Domestic Violence

Intimate Partner Violence (IPV)

 Intimate partner violence is domestic violence by a current or former spouse or partner in an intimate relationship against the other spouse or partner. IPV can take a number of forms, including physical, verbal, emotional, economic and sexual abuse.

Family Violence

 Family violence is a broader term, often used to include child abuse, elder abuse, and other types of abuse between family members.

Budget For DV Agencies

State General Fund \$20,601,961

- (1) 24/7 crisis hotlines
- (2) Counseling
- (3) Business Centers
- (4) Emergency shelters (24/7)
- (5) Emergency food and clothing
- (6) Emergency response to calls from law enforcement
- (7)Hospital emergency room protocol and assistance

- (8)Emergency transportation
- (9)Supportive peer counseling
- (10)Counseling for children
- (11)Court and social service advocacy
- (12)Legal assistance with temporary restraining orders, and custody disputes
- (13)Community resource and referral
- (14)Household establishment assistance

Differences

CES System

- Uniform protocols throughout the county.
- Services offered are similar at all locations.
- Referral process through walk-ins to access point, or interagency partnerships.

DV System

- Individualized protocol for each location.
- Referrals through resource centers and hotlines.
- Services and protocols can vary from agency or shelter.

Challenges

- Survivors not ready to enter shelter
- Hotline intakes
- Lack of understanding about services available
- Lack of uniformity in procedures
- Lack of transparency amongst providers
- Confidentiality

Domestic Violence Referral Information Center (DVIRC)

- Manual daily bed count conducted daily by Haven Hills
- New system to the LA region as of April 1st
- Updated on real time basis
- Disclaimer! Not all agencies have signed on yet

Calling DV Hotlines

- Operator will only speak to survivor
- Repeating intake process multiple times
- Limitations in accommodating males and LGBTQ+ community
- Limitations in pet accommodations
- Limited availability!



Preparing Survivors for DV ES

- Shelter will be outside of their current area
- Shelters are 24/7
- 48-72 hour holds
- May be unable to work during ES stay
- Cell phone usage may be limited or removed
- Children will be re-enrolled in school in new area
- May be unable to accommodate non-traditional families
 - I.E. Survivors, children, and survivor's older mother

After Emergency Shelter

- DV specific transitional housing
- Friends or family (I.E. problem solving)
- Shared living
- Housing through county services if eligible
- CES system
- Housing resources through DV agencies
- Survivor may return to perpetrator

Additional Tips

- Contact case manager
- Exchange consent of release of information
- Understand working with survivors may require more time
- Enlist dv agencies to support with information gathering relevant to assessment
