## **Runaway Homeless Youth Street Outreach Project**

# Agency Overview

- Founded in 1972 – began serving homeless, runaway youth in the South Bay area
- In 1981 – began domestic violence shelter program and currently is one of the largest DV shelter systems in Los Angeles County
- Our Emergency Youth Shelter is 1 of 3 shelters in Los Angeles County licensed to accept youth (boys and girls age 10 to 17) off the streets
- In 2018, a RHY Street Outreach Program was added to the agency's youth services to provide crisis services directly to transition-age youth found on the streets.
- Today, 1736 FCC programs span Los Angeles and Orange Counties and directly serve more than 6,000 individuals annually, including 2800 children and youth
- Each year, the agency reaches more than 15,000 community members through outreach and educational activities





# Our Mission

The **mission of 1736 Family Crisis Center** is to comprehensively help children, women, men and families through crisis circumstances, including domestic violence, homelessness, abuse, neglect, poverty, substance use, post-traumatic stress disorder, and distress, and to improve their prospects for long-term housing, safety, survival, financial stability, and success.

The **agency's purpose is to provide emergency, critical care, and rehabilitative services** for extremely vulnerable and often injured clientele – children, families, Veterans – who are facing or fleeing from life-threatening circumstances, including domestic violence, child abuse, sex trafficking, homelessness, and suicidal thinking.

Through a **network of residential and community-based service sites spanning Los Angeles and Orange counties**, the agency offers comprehensive, trauma-informed care to underserved populations with a **goal of creating self-sufficiency**.

# Crisis Intervention – Domestic Violence

- Five 24-hour crisis/suicide hotlines staffed with trained professionals
- DART – Domestic Abuse Response Team with LAPD; on-call and on-scene support
- Four confidentially-located domestic violence shelters in Los Angeles County
- Shelters accept large families; children from 0 to 17 years, including teenage boys



**1 in 3 women**  
report experiencing domestic violence in their lifetimes.

**Over \$5.8 billion**

each year is spent on health-related costs of domestic violence.<sup>[7]</sup>

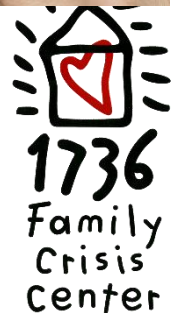
each year are lost due to domestic violence issues—the equivalent of more than 32,000 full-time jobs.<sup>[8]</sup>





# Crisis Intervention – Human Trafficking Program

- Approached by Homeland Security/ICE in 2015 to assist with a crisis intervention and supportive services solution
- Developed plan to integrate victims into shelter system and trained staff and community partners in 2016
- The majority of trafficked victims in the United States are U.S. citizens/residents
- 12 years – the average age of Commercially Sexually Exploited Children (CSEC)



# Crisis Intervention – Emergency Youth Shelter

- Homeless, runaway and abandoned youth, ages 10-17 years; shelter serves approximately 100 youth annually
- Many youth on the streets are in danger of gangs, drugs, sexual assault and sexual exploitation
- More than 90% of youth served report past domestic violence and abuse experiences
- 50% report that they are homeless due to parent/guardian kicking them out

# Supportive Services – Community Service Centers

- Mental Health Outpatient Clinics
- Housing Search and Placement Assistance
- Employment/Job Development Services
- Other supportive services (e.g. tax preparation, financial literacy training and coaching)
- Linkages to other community-based programs
- FamilySource Center program provides self-sufficiency services (adult) and academic enrichment services (youth) for low-income LA residents and their children

# RHY Street Outreach Program

- Funding through contract with the US Department of Health and Human Services, Administration for Children and Families.
- Serves Transition-Age Youth
- Provides for one (1) Street Outreach Coordinator and two (2) Street Outreach Workers
- Complements the agency's RHY Basic Center Program – Emergency Youth Shelter
- Youth contacted on the streets, through partner agencies and youth serving organizations
- Hygiene kit with information materials provided
- Hidden hotline card provided to youth suspected of being trafficked



# RHY Street Outreach Services

- 24-hour crisis intervention counseling
- 24-hour shelter intake -- for runaway, homeless, CSEC, human trafficking affected youth
- two to three weeks of shelter care with food, clothing, amenities
- individual/group/family mental health therapy and counseling
- case management
- advocacy
- independent living skills education (i.e. budgeting, nutrition, communication skills, anger/stress management)
- referrals/service linkages to free medical, legal, and other services
- job development activities; planned/supervised daily recreation
- alternative living placements if family reunification is not possible
- school enrollment/re-enrollment
- aftercare services
